
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ACCREDITATION

The Holmes County General Health District (HCGHD) was awarded national accreditation through the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) in August of 2022. Established in 2007, PHAB is the non-profit organization that administers the national accreditation program, which aims to advance and transform public health practice by championing performance improvement, strong infrastructure, and innovation. Across the nation, health departments provide services aimed at promoting healthy behaviors; preventing diseases and injuries; ensuring access to safe food, water, clean air, and life-saving immunizations; and preparing for and responding to public health emergencies. PHAB President and CEO Paul Kuehnert stated "People living and working in communities served by these health departments can be assured that their health department is strong and has the capacity to protect and promote their health. Just going through the accreditation process itself helps health departments pinpoint the areas that are critical to improving the work they do for their communities." By achieving PHAB Accreditation, HCGHD can continue carrying out its mission to protect and improve the health and environment of those who live, work, and play in Holmes County.

HEALTH COMMISSIONER

Public health in Holmes County has continued its successes, even in a difficult time for Public Health Practitioners. Our dedicated staff have persevered, endured, and rose to the occasion with excellence. It is by performing the following that our dedicated staff have rose to elite status among their peers:

- 1.Preventing Public Health crisis.
- 2.Promoting Public Health.
- 3.Protecting Public Health.
- 4.Being Kind.

Holmes County is now served by a nationally accredited health department. This process was tedious with many twists and turns along the way. I am inspired by the work our staff performed as we all recover from a global pandemic. If we work to inspire, we can impact change and strengthen a community. It sets the groundwork for new leaders to step up and into action, it inspires positive change, and it helps us remember our culture and where we have come from. I hope throughout this report you see how our staff have tried to inspire the community and work together to improve lives every day.

It is my hope that our community remembers that public health saves lives. For every 10 percent increase in local public health spending, it reduces infant deaths by 6.9%, cardiovascular deaths 3.2%, diabetes deaths 1.4% and cancer deaths 1.1%. Public health saves money. For every additional dollar spent on prevention programs and services, it saves \$5.60 in health spending. For every dollar spent on childhood vaccines saves \$16.50 on future health care costs. Also 75% of moneys spent on health are spent on preventable conditions, but only 3 cents of every \$1 is spent on public health and prevention. This agency has been great stewards of resources and has seen tremendous health impacts with minimal dollars spent. Holmes County ranks #4 in Ohio in life expectancy and due to the work of public health, has added 25 years on average to life.

I could not be prouder of our dedicated staff and the work that is performed for our community. Public Health is just one pillar of a community, and we all work together to make this a great place to live, work and play. We cannot stand alone and make a difference but as Ronald Regan stated, "We can't help everyone, but everyone can help someone." This agency with the support of our staff, Board, and community will continue to improve and strive for continued success by going through adversity so our community can prosper and give everyone a chance to help someone.







Program.



CMH (Children with Medical Handicaps)



The program now offers additional services for adult Cystic Fibrosis clients including, 18 days inpatient hospital, physician services, outpatient services, outpatient facility, dental services, surgery and anesthesia.



WIC (Women Infants and Children)



ANIMAL BITES REPORTED 2022




INSPECTIONS, SURVEYS, & GRANTS


2022 was a busy year for the Environmental Health Division. Our Environmental Health Specialists conducted 1,911 inspections in the Licensed and Permitted Program; responded to 51 animal bites; investigated 20 nuisance reports; and provided 237 consultations. 370 new construction permits were obtained in the Sewage and Private Water Programs, the highest number in 5-years. The Environmental Health Team was also happy to expand their participation in educational opportunities throughout the community, including speaking engagements at Holmes County Safety Council; West Holmes All-In Career Days; OSU Extension Food Safety Trainings; and Holmes-Wayne Sewage Contractor's Seminar.

All Environmental Health programs receive a survey from our partnering State agencies at a frequency determined by Ohio Revised Code. The Solid Waste, Private Water, and Retail Food programs all received surveys in 2022 from the Ohio EPA, Ohio Department of Health, and Ohio Department of Agriculture. Thanks to our hard working and knowledgeable staff, HCGHD is once again placed on each Agency's list of approved Local Health Districts to carry out these program activities.

The Environmental Health Team is proud to assist the community through our Grant funded programs. The Water Pollution Control Loan Fund was able to replace 13 failing septic systems for eligible homeowners in 2022. We were again awarded \$150,000 for 2023 and look forward to replacing more septic systems and even utilizing some of our award to assist with residential connections within the Winesburg Sewer Expansion project. The Recycle Ohio grant activities are continuing and are shaping up to beat last year's totals of 970 pounds of trash and 612 pounds of recyclables collected.

Falls Prevention Program

This year 2 new program sites were added, Big Prairie and Clark. Falls Prevention hosted 4 Positive Aging Workshops with 11 speakers presenting on various positive aging topics. A total of 91 individuals attended the Workshops.

Child Injury Prevention



 In its 2nd year of operation the safe sleep education program distributed 16 safe sleep environments to 15 caregivers at no cost to participants.

Car Seat Program

 Also in its second year, the car seat program in partnership with Ohio Buckeye Buckles program distributed 64 car seats in 2022. Car seats are also offered at no cost to qualifying families.






HMG Home Visiting
